Recent Advances in Mild Traumatic Brain Injury

CALL FOR PAPERS

In recent years there has been considerable public and research focus on mild traumatic brain injury. Research interest has ranged from investigations of cellular and subcellular changes to factors affecting short- and long-term recovery. Sports concussions, military-related blast injuries, and motor vehicle accidents are just some of the causes of mild traumatic brain injury that have been examined. Both paediatric and adult populations have been studied.

This special issue aims to create a multidisciplinary forum of discussion on recent advances in mild traumatic brain injury. This issue accepts high quality articles containing original research.

Potential topics include but are not limited to the following:

- ▶ Advances in the neurobiological basis of mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Advances in neuroimaging sensitivity to mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Advances in cognitive recovery after mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Advances in understanding the relationship between neuroimaging findings and cognition
- ▶ Predictors of recovery after mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Contributors to poor long-term outcome after mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Impact of mild traumatic brain injury on paediatric development
- ▶ Interventions for mild traumatic brain injury in paediatric populations
- ▶ Impact of multiple mild traumatic brain injury events
- ▶ The influence of psychological and psychiatric factors in mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Mechanistic and outcome differences between sports concussion, blast-related mild traumatic brain injury, and motor vehicle/work-related mild traumatic brain injury
- ▶ Advances in treatment for individuals with poor long-term outcome after mild traumatic brain injury
