Management of Advanced and Recurrent Gynecologic Cancers

CALL FOR PAPERS

Many treatment modalities are available for management of gynecologic cancers. Options of treatment vary depending on many factors including the primary site of cancer, type and stage of disease, availability of resources either physician or equipment, and the patients themselves.

Regardless of the primary site of cancer, early stage cancer generally has good prognosis and long survival. In a real medical practice, unfortunately, certain numbers of patients seek medical consultation when they have symptoms and more advanced disease. These later stage cancers have poorer prognosis, less favorable outcome after treatment, and shorter survival. These far advanced diseases frequently show unsatisfactory response and progress or recur after primary treatment. The situations have impact on many parties involved: the patients themselves, the physicians, caregivers, and the policy makers. Particularly to the patients, detrimental effects on various aspects are encountered: physical health, psychological impact, family burden, and financial budget. As a physician or caregiver, a search for the best treatment for our patients with either curative or palliative aims is important. With our goodwill and intention, there is always a light of hope for them.

The aim of the special issue is to open an international forum for all health caregivers to share their attitudes, opinions, research findings, and clinical experience in taking care of patients with gynecologic cancers.

Potential topics include but are not limited to the following:

- ▶ Novel technique radiotherapy (including chemoradiation) for advanced and recurrent gynecologic cancers
- ▶ Evolving new chemotherapy for advanced and recurrent gynecologic cancers
- ▶ Innovative surgical approach for advanced and recurrent gynecologic cancers
- ▶ Role of minimal invasive surgery for advanced and recurrent gynecologic cancers
- ▶ Update in adjuvant treatment for advanced gynecologic cancers after surgery
- ▶ Salvage treatment for advanced and recurrent gynecologic cancers: surgery, radiotherapy, chemotherapy, immunotherapy, or targeted therapy
- ▶ Quality of life of patients with advanced and recurrent gynecologic cancers including sexual dysfunction
- ▶ Best palliative care: how best is our best?
